FINDING RELEVANT GRANTS

- 1. Define your project.
 - a. Consider creating a short impact statement, consisting of a verb, an outcome, and a target population (i.e. "create DevDocs for Campus Y members to convey the resources available to them")
 - b. Find grants relevant to the issue.
- 2. Quantify your need.
 - a. Include necessary equipment, labor, rental space, food, and/or other expenses.
- 3. Make use of available resources to find grants.
 - a. Do your research on grant search engines and on the web.
 - b. Talk to DevCo and to the Director of the Campus Y.
- 4. Note deadlines and eligibility.
 - a. Ensure that the deadlines fit with your project timeline.
 - b. Read eligibility requirements carefully.
- 5. See the Grant-Writing DevDoc for tips on writing an effective grant.
- 6. Contact the Director of the Y (office on the first floor of the Y) or DevCo consultants if you want a pair of second eyes on your grant.

Foundation Grants

Google these foundations to find the respective grants that they offer.

- Chapel Hill Service League \$1,000-\$2,500 for projects that support women and children in Chapel Hill
- **Strowd Roses** projects located in Chapel Hill and Carrboro. Funding is awarded four times per year.
- **Davis Projects for Peace** projects that focus on themes such as reconciliation, breaking downbarriers, and finding solution for resolving conflict. Through a competition on over 90 campuses, projects are selected for funding at \$10,000 each.
- Mary Reynolds Babcock Foundation funding for organizations that help low-income communities build assets and transform economic conditions. Grants range from \$20,000 to \$200,000.
- **Sunshine Lady Foundation** grants of about \$2,000-\$5,000 for community organizations across NC to create positive change in areas of need.
- **Golden Leaf Foundation** projects that bring significant economic improvement to economically distressed and/or rural communities of North Carolina.
- **W. K. Kellogg Foundation** projects for educated kids, healthy kids, secure families, racial equity and civic engagement.
- **Youth Venture** seed funding of up to \$1,000, guidance, tools and support, allies who provide advice, mentoring and expertise for social ventures led by young people
- **Z Smith Reynolds** for innovative, community-based projects by 501(c)3 organizations with emphasis on reaching low-income or rural regions in NC
