Our committee decided on our theme, Vivir Mi Vida, because we wanted to spend the year focusing on how we, as Latinx people, are living our lives in the present. #### LA MADRE DEL MARICON: QUEER LATINX FAMILY IN THE HOUSE OF IMPOSSIBLE BEAUTIES

While scholars have written on the ballroom scene and its historical impact on queer identity formation and performance, not enough attention has been paid to the impact of family building on queer and Latinx literature outside of a conversation surrounding Paris Is Burning (which is well-known to be rife with controversy). By particularly centering a novel like The House of Impossible Beauties in the presentation, I am giving voice to a queer Latinx epistemology created outside of a queer academic context with basis in a queer reality.

#### **GENERATION 1.5 IMMIGRATION YOUTH FROM EL SALVADOR**

As the number of foreign-born students from Latin American countries integrates into our school system, schools require a better understanding of the lived experiences of newly arrived students in school classrooms. Particularly conflict-affected children and adolescents and how school systems can elevate their lived experiences through the application of a framework across the state.
